





PlayDaze Reflections

Soon as they let the kids go, the children were off to whatever attracted their eye. At first they were clustered with their class but they did it themselves, then about 5 or 6 minutes later they were mingling with other children and engaging into the different stations. The kids were laughing, engaging in conversation with peers and adults, listening to stories, running, jumping, rolling, digging, climbing, building, creating, throwing, splashing, and engaging themselves in imaginary play.

PlayDaze Reflections


The children that had behavioral problems were playing with others nicely, and going from station to station. The children with disabilities were able to engage in play without many limitations. For example, one of the children that was unable to walk and was placed in a stroller was able to pull up to the art station and paint on the hanging banner that they had out there, the child was able to get out of the stroller and throw dirt, play in big boxes, sit and play in the pool of water and clay, the pool of dirt and water, the sand area and basically every center. There was a therapy dog out that the kids were able to pet and play with. When I looked at our children individually, I noticed that no child was just standing or sitting around they were engaged and appeared to be having fun.


PlayDaze Reflections

This event will forever have a lasting impact on me. I will never forget this event and I know the children involved will not either. The fact that the children worked like little ants, marching back and forth to collect things to their forts, still amazes me! These kids had a fervent passion for what they were building and it really showed. Seeing them this way will help me to encourage more free play with my students. Outdoor play is the best freedom for a child. When they aren't limited to what they can do, they will amaze you.
